For some <br> of these new registries, all you need to <br> register your dog is to send them a picture <br> of your dog - so in this case the dog now <br> has 'papers' but they don't really prove the <br> parentage or heritage of the puppy as they <br> did not have to prove the parents were <br> registered and the grandparents, etc. Some <br> of the other registries all you have to do is <br> show them the dog is registered with the <br> AKC and they will also register you, <br> though again they do not have the original <br> history of the family of the dogs - only <br> AKC does. So....you need to be careful <br> not to just be satisfied with a dog having <br> 'papers' but you need to be sure they are |

More tests and genetic } \\ \text { advances occur and we will continue to } \\ \text { expand testing as it does. }\end{array} \\ \hline \begin{array}{l}\text { Do you know what makes a dog 'pure } \\ \text { bred?' }\end{array} & \begin{array}{l}\text { I think this one is obvious....a pure bred } \\ \text { dog means that its parents and its whole } \\ \text { family tree show that the dog has been } \\ \text { bred only to dogs of the same breed and } \\ \text { not to dogs of other breeds. Most of the } \\ \text { breeds in the AKC today have history that } \\ \text { dates back to the 1600s, 1700s in their } \\ \text { country of origin. When you hear about } \\ \text { new breeds here being added to the AKC, } \\ \text { that doesn't mean somebody just decided } \\ \text { to create one, it means this breed existed, } \\ \text { most likely in another country, for many } \\ \text { many years but has only been registered in } \\ \text { the US with sufficient numbers to be }\end{array} \\ \text { tracked as a breed in the kennel club. }\end{array}\right\}$

Many mixes today are } \\ \text { called 'designer dogs' and sold for as } \\ \text { much or more than pure bred dogs. }\end{array} \\ \hline \begin{array}{l}\text { Do you think you should ask puppy sellers } \\ \text { what health testing they do on the parents of } \\ \text { the puppies? }\end{array} & \begin{array}{l}\text { You bet. If you've done your research } \\ \text { then you know what types of things might } \\ \text { happen in that breed and should ask the } \\ \text { breeder what testing has been done and } \\ \text { what the results were. }\end{array} \\ \hline \begin{array}{l}\text { Do you think you should be shown or given } \\ \text { a copy of the results of health testing? }\end{array} & \begin{array}{l}\text { Sure....just like when buying anything } \\ \text { 'certified', you'll want to see the } \\ \text { certificate or test results to back up the } \\ \text { breeder's claims. | Do you think all dog "Breeders" are the <br> same? | This is an area where you should be able to <br> say 'No' quite quickly too. There are a <br> large number of differences in breeders <br> and types of breeders. There are large <br> commercial breeders - they have hundreds <br> of dogs and mostly sell to large puppy <br> operations like pet store chains. There are <br> people in your neighborhood who have a <br> dog or two and just want to see what its <br> like to breed a litter of puppies. There are <br> dog show folks who range from small <br> house based operations to relatively small <br> kennels....they breed a litter or 2 a year, <br> perform health screening, and are breeding <br> to improve their lines and since most litters <br> produce more than one puppy end up with <br> some quality puppies to sell to pet or other <br> show homes. |
| Do you think it is rude for a dog breeder to <br> ask you personal information about your <br> home, yard, family, past and current pet <br> ownership history, veterinary references? | We don't think so and here's why, unlike <br> pet stores and people who are just breeding <br> to see what its like, most show breeders try <br> to make sure that your family if the right <br> 'fit' for one of their puppies. We spend a <br> lot of time and money breeding, health |
| screening and loving our dogs and the |  |
| puppies they produce. It is our goal to sell |  |
| our puppies to home that are to the best of |  |
| our ability to tell a perfect fit for the breed |  |
| and any special challenges or needs of the |  |,

Some breeds should never be <br> without a fenced yard because they love to <br> run away, some do not do well with other <br> dogs so a family with 5 dogs already <br> would not be a great fit. Asking the <br> questions we do let's us understand the <br> situation the puppy would be sold into and <br> educate the potential buyer of the types of <br> problems that could arise based on their <br> family make-up or property situation. <br> Asking for veterinary references allows us <br> to make sure that if you have had pets <br> before or still have pets that your vet also <br> feels you are a responsible owner. |

| All pure bred dogs have national breed <br> clubs whose members sign a code of ethics <br> stating how they will conduct themselves in <br> breeding and selling puppies? | This is true. Each breed starts out with a <br> parent club that works to put together the <br> breed standard and organize the active <br> show people of the breed. Part of <br> membership includes the signing of a code <br> of ethics that may differ slightly from club <br> to club but mostly asks the breeder to be <br> ethical in their dealings with breeding and <br> selling of puppies. |
| After the Sale | Good breeders will not only welcome but <br> encourage you to keep in touch with them <br> to let them know how your puppy is <br> progressing. Pictures, e-mails, phone <br> calls to touch base are great as well as <br> making sure there is an open line of <br> communication so you'll feel comfortable <br> calling anytime you have a question, <br> problem or situation you need advice on. |
| Do you think you should be able to contact <br> the breeder after you buy the puppy? |  |
| This is pretty much as true as the question <br> above. There should be an open line of <br> communication to make sure that you are <br> not struggling with any problems or <br> waiting until a problem has gotten too bad <br> and can't be fixed. |  |

Knowledge is the power } \\ \text { that binds a family to a good pet for life. } \\ \text { All puppies are cute and adorable at 8 } \\ \text { weeks old when they are able to go to be } \\ \text { sold, but knowing what to expect from that } \\ \text { puppy is the key to being able to live with } \\ \text { that puppy for life. Different breeds have } \\ \text { different traits, for example: some shed so } \\ \text { if you don't mind a lot of vacuuming that } \\ \text { that might not bother you but if a lot of }\end{array} \\ \text { vacuuming and hair on your clothes or } \\ \text { furniture would drive you crazy, then you } \\ \text { need to select a breed that does not shed. } \\ \text { The trade off for not shedding is a dog that } \\ \text { will require more grooming } \\ \text { (combing/brushing/bathing).
